MR. SIBLEY: Good evening. If we could come to order and we will go ahead and get started. Welcome to this public hearing of the Alabama Department of Environmental Management. My name is Shawn Sibley, and I'm designated to be the hearing officer for these proceedings.

The role of the hearing officer is limited to ensuring an orderly hearing so that an accurate record of the hearing may be developed by the Department's evaluation. I don't make the decision on the modification of the permit.

On behalf of Director Lance LeFleur and the Department, we appreciate your attendance and participation in this hearing. The subject of this hearing is the proposed modification of Municipal Solid Waste Permit No. 53-03 for Perry County Associates, LLC, to increase the disposal acreage within the permitted
facility of Arrowhead Landfill from 256.151 acres to 425.33 acres.

The purpose of this hearing is to provide the public with an opportunity to present oral testimony on the proposed modification of this permit.

In addition to oral testimony, the Department will also consider all written comments submitted before the close of the public comment period. The Department has requested your comments, and we appreciate you taking the time to make them known to us.

The notice of the time, date, place, and purpose of this hearing was published in the Marion Times and the Selma Times-Journal on November 9th, 2011.

In addition, the Department also sent notice of this hearing by direct mail to 22 individuals and organizations, and 2, 400 individuals and organizations by electronic mail. And these are individuals that have previously requested advanced
notice of all permit proceedings.
A copy of the notice and certification of publication and the mailing list will be entered into the record of these proceedings. A copy of the public notice, the permit application, and the proposed permit modification have been made available for inspection by the public at the Department of Environmental Management's office at 1400 Coliseum Boulevard in Montgomery. The notice, application, and the proposed permit modification have also been made available on the Department's Web site.

The hearing is open to the public, and anyone wishing to present oral testimony or written statements may do so. Those who have not previously completed a registration card to give testimony should do so at this time and present it to the Department representative in the back.

Those who wish to receive the Department's response to comments should
also fill out a registration card. Lengthy statements and those containing considerable technical or other complex data should be submitted in writing.

Summaries of those statements may be presented orally. All testimony, written comments, handwritten comments should be as factual as possible and should address the subject of the hearing.

Again, this hearing is an opportunity for the members of the public to offer comments to help assure that relevant factors are considered before a final permit decision is made.

Persons giving testimony will
not be subject to questioning by the public, but may be questioned by the hearing officer, the Department, or the Department's staff to clarify points and to develop a better understanding of what's being presented.

This proceeding today is not an open forum, as in a question and answer
session. Rather it's an opportunity for you to submit comments that you wish the Department to consider in the final review of this proposed permit modification. However, you may pose a comment in the form of a question, which will be compiled and addressed by the Department in its complete response to comments.

It's important to know that written comments submitted through the mail are given the same consideration as those presented in person at this hearing. All oral and written testimony will be included in this hearing record.

In addition to oral testimony, written comments may also be submitted. Written statements previously submitted and those received during this hearing or before five o'clock p.m., Thursday, December 22nd, 2011 will be included in this hearing record.

Once complete, the hearing record, including the transcript of this
hearing, all written submissions received by the Department before the close of the comment period will be open to public inspection at the Department's offices in Montgomery.

After giving full consideration to the hearing record, the Department of Environmental Management will announce its decision on the proposed permit modification.

Now, on to the purpose of this hearing, which is the receipt of public comments. The order of appearances of the persons giving testimony will be as follows: First, a representative of the Department of Environmental Management, a representative of Perry county Associates, LLC, then any elected officials or their representatives who have registered to speak, and all remaining members of the public will be heard in the order that they filed their registration cards.

If you wish to testify and
you've not already registered to do so, please register in the back at this time. I would ask that each person making a statement step up to the podium and the microphone, state your name, any interest or organization that you represent.

Keep in mind, we do have quite a few people that have just come in. And it looks like they have registered, but we ask you to try to limit your comments to approximately five minutes out of consideration for the others behind you that want to speak.

I will now recognize Mr. Shane
Lovett to present a statement on behalf of the Department of Environmental Management. MR. LOVETT: Good evening.

My name is Shane Lovett on behalf of the Alabama Department of Environmental Management. We thank for your participation in the permitting process for the Arrowhead Landfill, Permit 53-03.

Perry County Associates, LLC,
has submitted to the Alabama Department of Environmental Management an application to modify the Solid Waste Disposal Facility Permit for the Arrowhead Landfill located near Uniontown in Perry County, Alabama.

The Arrowhead Landfill facility is located in Sections 21, 22, 27, and 28, Township 17 north, Range 6 east, on County Road 1 in Perry County. The proposed modification expands the permitted disposal area from 256.15 acres to 425.33 acres.

The proposed disposal area expansion is shown in the figures in the front of the room. The permitted facility boundary for the Arrowhead Landfill will remain 976.97 acres.

The waste stream, service area, and maximum average daily volume currently permitted for the Arrowhead Landfill would all remain the same. Based on our review of the application, the Department has made a preliminary determination that the proposed disposal area expansion can be
constructed and operated in a manner which would be in compliance with the applicable state and federal solid waste disposal requirements, and thus protective of public health and the environment.

The proposed permit includes the following conditions: The permit expiration would remain September 26, 2016; the permittee would construct a composite liner, as described in the permit and permit application, including a leachate collection system; the permittee would continue to conduct groundwater monitoring semiannually; the permittee would continue to conduct explosive gas monitoring; the permittee would at all times properly operate and maintain the facility and all systems in accordance with the application and the permit; the permittee would maintain the integrity of the final cover system throughout the life of the permit and post-closure period; the permittee would obtain the approval of ADEM for any
change or modification to the facility or a system which might otherwise result in noncompliance with the permit or ADEM's administrative codes.

The purpose of tonight's hearing is to provide an opportunity to receive public comment regarding the application and proposed permit. The Department welcomes your input into this process and will consider all technical comments prior to making a final decision concerning the issuance of the permit and will provide a written response to each commenter and to those requesting specific notice of our decision.

Thank you again for
participating in the hearing.
MR. SIBLEY: We're going to
proceed now onto the receipt of public comment. And first I'm going to call on Mr. Matt Cheek on behalf of the permit applicant.

MR. CHEEK: Good evening.

I'm Matt Cheek, a professional engineer with Hodges, Harbin, Newberry-Tribble, Incorporated. We are the engineering firm that prepared the major modification plans for the applicant. I have been involved as one of the -- engineering for this facility since it opened in October.

We are here today for a major modification of the permitted facility. In general, I can say, as one who prepared this modification application, that the environmental controls, liner system, and leachate collection systems are not changing from the way the site is currently permitted or from the way it has operated the last few years.

The proposed modification will change the waste disposal boundaries and the life of the site. This modification will not change the permitted service area or the daily tonnage acceptance rate. ADEM has reviewed the application documents for consistency with the rules and current
conditions at this site since waste-filling operations have been ongoing at this facility.

We thank you for being here, and we look forward to the hearing.

MR. SIBLEY: Thank you, Mr. Cheek. Is there any elected officials here or representatives of any elected officials here that would like to speak now?
(No response.)
MR. SIBLEY: There is no
response.
I'm going to move on to Sunny Williams, if you would please come forward.

MR. WILLIAMS: Good evening, everybody.
(Audience response.)
MR. WILLIAMS: I need to
speak to one of the gentlemen right quick.
MR. SIBLEY: Keep in mind, if you could come around the to the mic.

Hold on, Mr. Cheek. One thing
we want you to do is, I want you to face the court reporter so she can get everything that you're saying. That's how we have to have a good record. So if you can, make sure that she can hear you. MR. WILLIAMS: I need to ask
a question right quick. We told our commission that we didn't need a landfill in Uniontown, and they were so smart they (microphone disruption) and under the landfill is the cemetery. Is there any way that you're (microphone disruption) supposed to mess with that the cemetery, I need to know that.

MR. SIBLEY: Mr. Williams,
what was it about the cemetery?
MR. WILLIAMS: Do you
supposed tell me what the date of the cemetery of the landfill? I need to know that.

MR. SIBLEY: All right, keep in mind this is not a question and answer session, but we do have your concerns. I
just want to make sure it's clear for the record.

MR. WILLIAMS: And another thing, where that landfill is is houses around there and churches, and we don't need a landfill in Uniontown. You-all take the landfill, go anywhere all but Uniontown. Thank you.

MR. SIBLEY: Thank you,
Mr. Williams. I call on Ms. Barbara Evans. And behind Ms. Evans is Chester Fikes. That's who would be next.

MS. EVANS: Good evening,
everybody.
(Audience response.)
MS. EVANS: My name is
Barbara Evans, and I'm a member of the Blackbelt Citizens Fighting for Health and Justice, and we want you to deny this permit to expand the capacity of Perry County Landfill.

First of all, the landfill owner, Perry Uniontown Ventures I, and
permittee, Perry County Associates, LLC, were not able to pay their bankruptcy creditors and have been forced to sell. Presently the landfill and permit are managed by a liquidating trustee. Very shortly the new owner of the landfill and permit will be Arrowhead III, LLC, about which we know nothing about.

We have no idea their financial
status and whether or not they would be financially responsible in the event of a closing or of a crisis. It's clear that ADEM failed to check out the previous owners, or the bankruptcy would not have occurred. So the permit modification applicant no longer operates the landfill; therefore, PCA cannot be granted a permit modification.

I've come before ADEM for the past 20 years, and $I$ have never known you to deny a landfill permit. You've consistently failed to consider the impact on communities. You've turned your head in
environmental racism. While you choose to present yourselves as a state agency with objectivity, in reality your actions over the years prove that you're ruled by politics. What's even worse, you cater to the corporations who delight in your weak policies and our weak state laws.

I have personally witnessed some of your employees lobbying at the State House for policies that are not environmentally sound. Last session your people lobbied to classify coal ash as household waste, and they were successful.

You had several people working on this issue full force. You should have been embarrassed at the performance of Russell Kelly, who was unable to answer questions about coal ash when questioned by a legislative committee.

It was not uncommon to see your staff people build personal relationships with lobbyists for coal, The Southern Company, Alabama Power, and landfill advocates.

This Perry County Landfill has been a disaster from the beginning. You care nothing for the people living right across the road from this dump. You care nothing about their health. And if you are testing the water, land, and air, you're surely not telling us the results.

If the permittee is supposed to be testing the air and water and land, they're not telling us. And it sound to me like the fox watching the hen house.

You don't seem to care that the people who live across the road have now lost all value to their land. And you greedily accept the money your agency gets from coal ash. We need you to hire an outside firm, not ADEM and not the landfill people, to test the air, water, and soil at least quarterly and make it available to the public.

Naturally people are outraged about the coal ash that continues being
brought into the Perry County Landfill. Everybody seems to be able to see the unfairness of it all. You've helped to try to sell the people a bill of goods that could result in health problems and may already be resulting in health problems. Now you're considering expanding the dump. We all know you've never seen a permit you didn't love. You have done nothing to protect these folks. We know this public hearing is something you have to endure, but $I$ want you to think about it as individual people.

The people of Uniontown resent their town being the dumping ground for the rich and powerful. Over and over again they've tried to get justice. They're not just fighting for their selves, their land, and their families, they're fighting for all of us.

While you enjoy the Christmas holidays with your family and loved ones, the people of Uniontown have a huge cloud
over their lives. They've lost all security. While others are able to enjoy peaceful rural living, Uniontown has to endure smells, buzzards, and rats. Their lives have been changed, and not for the better.

Our group has been to Atlanta and Washington, D.C., and we will not stop until that coal ash is removed from the dump and ADEM forces the landfill owners to properly manage that landfill.

I've watched your staff people come and go over these 20 years. Many of them simply cannot live with themselves and be a part of ADEM because it becomes clear that the people of this state mean little compared to the friendship of the powerful corporations when they dump their toxins on poor rural communities.

Some of them realize that just because you work for ADEM does not relieve you of your human responsibility to do what's right. This is a chance for ADEM to
do the right thing. That means people before profit. It means caring about people. We all pray that you deny this permit.
(Audience applause.)
MR. SIBLEY: Call on Chester
Fikes, and Mrs. Owen Burkes would be next after Mr. Fikes.

MR. FIKES: My name is
Chester Fikes. I'm a resident on County Road 21, right across from the landfill, which it impacts every day. And my question is to this firm: I agree with her 110 percent, you say that you want to be fair. Okay, you say that you put this in the Selma Times-Journal. We don't live in Selma. We live in Uniontown.

Not only that, you say you sent
it out to 25 people here. Name them.
Where is the -- where is the merit of this town? Where is the guy that we represent that we put in office to stand up and fight for us?
(Audience applause.)
MR. FIKES: And when
folks -- $I$ know the power. I pray for a guarantee of that. I'm sick and tired of it. I work at -- you say the Marion TimesJournal. They don't bring that paper but once every two weeks. Is that the type of notice that we get? What you was expecting, 15 people?

We -- and then we get a robocall at, what, $4: 30$, and we supposed to all everybody go to stop their lives to come up here. That seem fair to me? Does it seem fair to you-all?
(Audience response.)
MR. FIKES: I don't think
it's fair. So I mean, I think you-all
already done the major decision on how you-all going to do this. I mean, this is just something to put on for a show.
(Audience applause.)
MR. SIBLEY: Mrs. Owen
Burkes, and Ms. Mary Shaffer would be up
next.
MRS. BURKES: My name -good evening, everybody.
(Audience response.)
MRS. BURKES: My name is
Owen M. Rachael Burkes. I am speaking as a concerned citizen. My children don't even live here. They are adults. But I was talking to a lady who lived near the landfill the other day. My heart went out the her. She said she had cancer. She had pears, which were juicy pears. Now they are tiny, and she was advised not to eat them.

And there is not enough communication in this community to let people know when they're having something. By coincidence, someone did tell me about it beforehand. I heard the announcement a little before I came up here. We need to know what's going on in.

And it's not just going to
affect those people who live right around
there in the community. It's going to affect everybody all around, even the neighboring counties, whether you know it or not, because the water, the birds, and I don't even want to plant a garden around here.

But what about the future of
this town? Who wants to come to a town where there's a landfill, whether it's going to be for -- I don't know how many states and all like that. I grant you that you do need one for our waste, but we do not need to accommodate New York and all those other states.
(Audience response.)
MRS. BURKE: And 33 states,
why can't they keep their own mess? We don't want the stuff dumped up on us and everything. And there were other places. I understand they wanted to put one in Tuskegee. Seems that it is after the black communities as a whole, and they are not able to move out.

And I even saw on national TV about the waste that was being brought down here from Tennessee, the ashes and stuff. Who wants ashes? I was here -- I like fresh air. I like beaches and stuff like that. I like Uniontown, but I do not like what has been dumped down our throats. So I said, "God bless Uniontown."
(Audience applause.)
MR. SIBLEY: Ms. Barbara Shaffer, and Esther Calhoun would be after Ms. Shaffer.

MS. SHAFFER: Good evening, everyone.
(Audience response.)
MS. SHAFFER: My name is
Mary Shaffer. Most of you-all know that I have spoken $I$ guess at every single landfill hearing and solid waste management plan hearing that we have had here, whether sponsored by ourselves, by EPA, or by ADEM.

It just really gets very
discouraging. I know how you all feel. It gets very discouraging when we continue to try to talk to our state officials and we feel like what we have to say falls on deaf ears.

We are just as human as you-all are. We are just as human as the people in Kingston, Tennessee. We have the same American rights to life, liberty, the pursuit of happiness, to the enjoyment of the properties that we own. We picked to live in the country. We chose to live here. Many of us our ancestors chose to live here. Our roots are here. Our friends are here. Our churches are here.

This blight that ADEM has allowed to come on this area is so disgusting, so horrific, so absolutely appalling. It is such a miscarriage of justice. We have told our county officials we did not want it. We actually unelected two of them to let them know how unhappy we were with how they did. We understand that
they are the ones who brought this here, but ADEM has cooperated with it every step of the way.

ADEM cooperated also to bring the coal ash here. ADEM has cooperated with every permit renewal, every expansion, every increase, the amount of tonnage to come here every day. The allowed tonnage has doubled.

As a matter of fact it was ADEM's suggestion that this permit be changed from only the state of Alabama to the 16 states, and now it's 33 states. Thirty-three states is two-thirds of America.

Why should this little town get garbage from two-thirds of America. It just infuriates us no end. Where is the study to see on this expansion of waste cells, what impact it will have on the jurisdictional wetlands and waterways that are on this property.

Has such a study been done? If
it is has not been done, then legally you are not able to expand and give approval for this new set of waste area.

And I happen to know by my own personal knowledge that when this landfill was initially permitted, arm twisting must have happened with the core of engineers because $I$ was told myself that this permit would not be issued while there were 16 jurisdictional waterways, and $I$ think over 20 -odd jurisdictional wetlands on this property. I may have those numbers backward. I'm not sure.

But $I$ was told by the core of engineers that a different -- I think it's was called a 404 permit, which much more impact studies would have to be done before this permit was issued, but this is Alabama and this is Alabama politics. And it is shameful. It is absolutely shameful.

Here we are, people who just want to live in peace and tranquility. We are not trying to harm anyone. And the
idea that the State of Alabama would bring this thing here and would then foist off all of the Tennessee coal ash and now be trying to expand this dump is absolutely appalling.

We want you to know how unhappy we are with you. We want you to know it. There is absolutely no legal justification to expand a permit of someone who has declared bankruptcy. That is absurd. Federal regulations require the permit -the permittee to give financial assurance.

And we've been over this track before with you-all. You never allowed us any information about the financial status of PCA or Perry Uniontown Ventures. We've yet to see any about the new people who will probably be taking this over.

But you cannot legally expand a permit for someone who's already defaulted. How can you do such a thing? It makes absolutely no sense. I may not be a lawyer, but I've got common sense.

If they're not able to bear up under their current financial obligations, how can you expand a permit for them that could give them greater obligations and liabilities? Somebody is not thinking clearly in Montgomery. Maybe it's the drift of coal ash dust from Uniontown that's affecting their brains. Certainly disturbing.
(Audience applause.)
MS. SHAFFER: I want to say
very strongly, ADEM needs to step back and take a look at this. They need to realize you can't -- just don't have the blanket authority to issue an expansion of a permit when you have a defaulted permittee and a defaulted landfill owner.

It would be a different story if this expansion were being requested by someone who has just newly taken over. But how they could justify that? I don't know. The whole operation there has been mismanaged from the start.

We've talked about things like this in the past. We've talked about the graves that were bulldozed down there. We've talked about the artifacts that were supposed to be located on the eight historic sites that were designated by the Alabama Historical Commission. We've yet to see one artifact. We've yet to see one bone of any ancestor treated with respect and removed or relocated to a place where their descendents could pay due respect to it. And so insult on top of insult on top of insult.

I know you two gentlemen up there are not the gentlemen that are, quote, responsible for this situation. But if you have any conscience at all, you need to go back to Montgomery and talk to those people who are your associates and discuss these matters with them.

There is something very wrong in what is being done by ADEM to the people of Alabama, absolutely wrong. And don't think
that it has gone over our heads. It has not. We are very familiar with what is going wrong. Thank you all.

> (Audience applause.)

MR. SIBLEY: C.R. Maddox
would be behind Ms. Calhoun.
MS. CALHOUN: Good evening. (Audience response.)

MS. MADDOX: What $I$ have to
say is $I$ think if everybody just takes a good look at this situation. What if this was your home? This is all that we have. I mean, nobody seems to care. But let me tell you, this is the only the beginning. You can listen or you can wait until later to see what happens.

Someone has to open their eyes. Someone has to step up. It's time to step up and listen to what the people say. We are the people. Who is here to listen? Where is our commissioners? Where is our leaders? It's something wrong. This is all the people of the community. This is

Uniontown.
I mean, more would be here if a little more was notified. We wasn't notified. We tried to tell some of the people. But if you going to do something, don't do it with two, three, or four people. Do it with the whole community. Let the whole community know what's going on in Uniontown. We do not need another dump. Uniontown was a beautiful place. I mean, we love the country. Anyone would love the country. You can't hang out clothes. I mean, you can't even breathe in good air. What do you know what you're breathing in? How would you love to live across from the dump? Most of us was inherit the land, and it's very precious to us.

What if this was something that belonged to you, that belonged to your child, that you wanted to leave to your child? What do these blacks -- most of them are black. What do they have to leave
to their children? That's all we have is a dump. I mean, money -- it's precious to some other people, but what is the money -what do we have, Uniontown, seriously?
(Audience response.)
MS. CALHOUN: Where is the
money? Thank you.
(Audience response.)
(Audience applause.)
MR. SIBLEY: C.R. Maddox.
MS. MADDOX: How are you?
MR. SIBLEY: I'm fine.
MS. MADDOX: Good evening,
gentlemen, citizens of Uniontown.
(Audience response.)
MS. MADDOX: I really wasn't
aware that this meeting was being held.
Unfortunately we don't have a locally circulated newspaper.
(Audience response.)
MS. MADDOX: Unfortunately
we don't have the locally circulated newspaper, so we were unable to get the
notice for this. And the only thing that $I$ wanted to bring forth is that $I$ had gotten some misconceptions that $I$ just got some clearance from. It was that you guys were trying to expand from the eleven-plus hundred acres to more.

But what $I$ understand now from the gentlemen back there, you're trying to open up another cell. I would like to bring your attention back to the meeting that we had earlier this year, and I received this letter of response from you, dated September 27 th.

I've given the information to Mr. Story where you guys have allegedly denied that you knew anything about PCA not being a legitimate company, about PCA not having any financial insurance, about PCA not having a legitimate office or not even being a legitimate company.

I have given him a copy of the sworn deposition where you-all were deposed. So I was very, very, very
discouraged when $I$ received this from you-all because the way --

And you were here, sir. I don't remember your face, but I remember your face. You were here.

And the way that you wrote it down, I'm not quite clear. But I specifically made a point to let you know that Mr. Matthews had sworn under deposition that his company was not legitimate, had never existed, had no legitimate office, no anything. His primary purpose was just like a grant writer, a grant writer that writes grants. He writes proposals for permits, and he then, in fact, sold that permit for a profit.

So the entire thing was all about money and money making. But what you wrote to us was very condescending.

You were there, too.
And that's all $I$ have to say. I have spoken with Mr. Story. I have made my
point known, and $I$ want to ask one question. Is this about expanding, or is this about incorporating another cell within the 1,100 acres that you already have?

MR. SIBLEY: Can't answer that, but we can when we respond to comments formally, okay. But we -- again, this is just --

MS. MADDOX: You cannot tell
us? You're here as a part of ADEM, and you're coming here as informants to the community and you can't tell us what you're here for?

MR. SIBLEY: Well, we're here to get your comments and we do have your question.

MS. MADDOX: Our comments on
what?
MR. SIBLEY: On this
proposed permit modification.
MS. MADDOX: What is the
modification?

MR. SIBLEY: I am not going to answer your question right now.

MS. MADDOX: But we have to
know what we're here for.
MR. SIBLEY: I understand that.

MS. MADDOX: And that's my problem. You are not telling us what the modification is.

MR. SIBLEY: Find out that when we response to your comments formally after we considered the record. The purpose of this is getting what your comments are into the record, okay. And you've done that, okay, and we appreciate that.

MS. MADDOX: Okay, sir, you
said you were coming here to get our opinion on a modification. How are you going to get our opinion on a modification if we don't know what the modification is? We don't know what the modification is. That's my problem.

Do you understand?
(Audience response.)
MR. SIBLEY: Let me get Mr. Story to read it again, and then maybe that will answer your question.

MS. MADDOX: Wait, calm down. Let's just get what the modification is.

MR. SIBLEY: Hold on.
Address me, so she can hear you.
MS. MADDOX: Okay, I've been
told the modification is expansion of the 1,100 acres, 1,100 plus acres. Then I've been told by representatives of your staff that the modification is just doing another cell.

But if you come to us, sir, please, sir, we -- I mean, you can look out among us. And irrespective to whether you think we are the sharpest crayon in the box or not, some of us understand that we have to know what the modification is.

MR. SIBLEY: Let me get --
let me get him to read his statement again. MS. MADDOX: Okay.

MR. SIBLEY: And hopefully
that will be able to help for you.
MS. MADDOX: Thank you.
MR. SIBLEY: But that is as
much as $I$ can do under these circumstances, okay. We will respond to your comments. MS. MADDOX: We don't
understand what the modification is.
MR. LOVETT: It says, "The
proposed modification expands the permitted disposal area from 256.15 acres to the 425.33 acres. The permitted facility boundaries for the Arrowhead Landfill would remain 976.97 acres."

MS. MADDOX: Okay, sir, you're saying that the three cells that you have now --

MR. SIBLEY: Okay, now, you
can ask that question, but that doesn't mean any one of us are going to answer it on the record.

MS. MADDOX: Well, what are you here for? Are you here for us?

MR. SIBLEY: Hold on, let
me --
MS. MADDOX: Okay, sir, are you as ADEM, as the department of the State, are you here to ensure that we, as the people, understand, or are you representing yourself as an attorney at law for the landfill to say we are not at liberty to say?

MR. SIBLEY: Ms. Maddox --
MS. MADDOX: All we are
asking is as a department of the State, Alabama, the Department of the Environmental Management, that means all of us out here are integral entities and we have a vested interest.

MR. SIBLEY: Ms. Maddox, let
me finish. Can $I$ finish?
MS. MADDOX: Yes, sir.
MR. SIBLEY: Okay, you've
asked your question. It's been noted,
okay. Mr. Lovett has repeated what he -his statement has said about the permitted area. Is there any other comments that you would like to make at this point?

MS. MADDOX: Yes, sir.
MR. SIBLEY: Okay, and I'm
going to --
MS. MADDOX: Are you going to answer the question?

MR. SIBLEY: Not now I'm not.

MS. MADDOX: Okay, very good.

MR. SIBLEY: Thank you.
MS. MADDOX: So are we to
assume that the Alabama Department of Environmental Management came down here, not to answer our -- entertain and answer our questions, but just to hear what we had to say? Yes or no, sir? Yes or no, sir -like you asked me.

> MR. SIBLEY: I'm going to repeat what the purpose of this hearing is.

MS. MADDOX: Are you here just to hear and entertain our questions, or are you here to answer them?

MR. SIBLEY: Do you have --
MS. MADDOX: Yes or no?
MR. SIBLEY: -- any other
comments, Ms. Maddox?
MS. MADDOX: I don't have --
that was it. Yes or no?
MR. SIBLEY: Is there anyone
else that's not signed up in the back that would like to speak?
(Audience applause.)
MR. SIBLEY: Again, let me
ask, is there anyone else that has not signed up in the back that would like to offer any comments? And keep in mind this is not a question/answer session. This is for you to present your comments. And they can be in the form of questions, okay.

And I'm going to ask one more
time. Is there anyone else that has not signed up to speak that would like to do so
now?
You would, ma'am?
MS. LONG: Yes.
MR. SIBLEY: If you could,
when you get to podium, please state your name.

MS. LONG: I'm Kitty Gray
Long, and I'm a resident of Uniontown. I live within the city limits on the road that goes out to the dump, and I've measured the distance as four miles. I've had an awful lot of undesirable traffic come by me during the years that the dump's been there. The trucks pass by my home on the way out and they come back on the way back. And the leachate truck comes by my house full of leachates.

I've appreciated all of these comments tonight. I do resent the fact that you-all cannot -- are not at liberty to talk to us. You don't seem to serve the public. You just are operating as an agency of the state, I guess, or the agency
of these people who want to put the dump in.

I notice there's a map over
there on an easel, and $I$ am trying to understand it. I saw the original proposal when we first heard about this dump coming, and there were three cells. I don't know that I'm at liberty to find out now how many cells you're using. I certainly have seen many times that enormous mountain that's been created out there.

Now, I would hope that you,
since you're representing your agency, your Department, that you would be at liberty to go over there and discuss what's on that board.

Now, there's some dotted lines.
I imagine that board is there for our information. I don't think you just brought it to carry it over here. But I don't understand it.

And that -- $I$ know that
property. I don't want to start rambling
on, but it was originally my ancestors who owned that property, and they're my cousins that sold it. I don't resent it. I don't like it, but it was their land and they had inherited it.

But it's a disgrace what's been done with it. Now, if you-all could explain -- are you at liberty to mention anything about that black -- that poster over there?
(Audience response.)
MR. SIBLEY: Ms. Long, you can pose that as a question. Is there anything else?

MS. LONG: Well, I don't want to pose it as a question anymore. I'm just going to say $I$ want you to discuss that with me.
(Audience applause.)
MS. LONG: Will you open up a discussion on your part as -- with me, or however you want to put it? I'd like for you to telling us what that is. What is
that over there?
MR. SIBLEY: The members of the ADEM staff are here if you have any questions.

MS. LONG: I don't want to ask it in private. I'm asking it --

MR. SIBLEY: Again, the format of this hearing is just for you to comment and pose your questions so we can get an accurate record.

MS. LONG: Well, then what is the hearing good for? What is the hearing good for? You just want to come here and hear us yap about what we don't like when you know we don't like it anyway?

Do you realize that it is a waste of our a time? You are getting paid to come down here. Some of us may have had to pay somebody to bring us here or we may have had to employ someone to keep our children at home. It's not easy to get around without paying something.

MR. SIBLEY: Is there
anything else that you would like to ask about on the record?

MS. LONG: I don't see why it does me any good. You said is there anything you want to ask about. What good does it do me to ask?

MR. SIBLEY: Is there
anything else you want to say?
MS. LONG: Please don't try to aggravate me because $I$ don't want to get aggravated.

MR. SIBLEY: I'm not.
MS. LONG: While I was
sitting over there, I got to thinking about a remark that I've heard practically all my life, and is it, "There's something rotten in Denmark"? Is that the remark?

And I thought, "Well, there certainly is something rotten in ADEM." Now, I'm not pointing at you gentlemen. I'm just pointing at the system. I don't know why Alabama wants the thing in it, just for money, I guess.

And the man who originally
started this, as $I$ understand it, put this together was a real estate developer. He wasn't even involved in the landfill business. He just was doing it as a real estate developer.

I'm glad someone's looking at
that thing, but it doesn't look exactly like the original three. Have I used up on five minutes?

MR. SIBLEY: You're pretty
close. Is there anything else you'd like to say?

MS. LONG: There's a lot I'd
like to say, but $I$ just really don't know how to phrase it. And $I$ would even put in I don't think $I$ could phrase it and still express it as a lady, you know. I think I just can't come right out to what $I$ really think about it.

I really didn't know $I$ was going to get this aggravated, and you gentleman are nice men, $I$ feel sure personally, and
you're in the world to make a living and you got a family probably to support.

But there's something wrong with
that ADEM operation, and I think that should be made public. You have to issue licenses, and you have to give permits and get paid. You have to fine people and get paid in order to get your salaries. That's the bottom line, as $I$ understand it.

$$
\text { If I'm incorrect, } I \text { would }
$$

welcome a correction. But $I$ understand you're not funded by the State of Alabama. I guess that means you don't get any tax money. It's a hopeless situation.

MR. SIBLEY: Thank you.
(Audience applause.)
MR. SIBLEY: I call on
Mr. Robert Bamberg. Mr. Bamberg, would you like to speak?

MR. BAMBERG: I swore -- I
swore $I$ wasn't going to have anything to say tonight. And I've had eye surgery, so that's the reason I'm wearing the shades.

I ain't scared to be seen. I want to point out that for you visitors, you ought to be able to detect from the people's attitude here that this landfill is not appreciated and not accepted. And $I$ want to underline that and say, "And never will be."

I also want to say that it's easy for everybody in this room to look around and see who's a visitor and who's not. It's easy to pick out home folk from visitors.

Now, I think I've been to all these meetings. I think I've been to every ADEM meeting that's been held. I've been to every EPA meeting that's been held, and I can't tell you how tired I am of listening to employees of ADEM and EPA explaining to us how to feel better about being thrown under the bus.

Tonight is nothing. This little announcement -- it's been in the mill for years. It's just time to exercise the next move. We all got thrown under the bus
years ago, and you visitors come and try and make us feel better about it like -like we've got something worth hearing. Cynthia Maddox -- we can't even get that determined as to whether our visitors are here to listen to our objections or answer our questions. And the reason is because that ain't your job. Your job is just to drive over here from wherever that is -- Montgomery, let's say -- put in two or three hours and listen to this and sit here and just do the paperwork and take notes -- take notes and listen to folks who articulate poorly or articulate in a great fashion.

But you don't understand -- who is it said, "You don't understand what it's like to live across the road" -- from a dump, now. We're not talking about a landfill. Don't -- don't -- don't come in here and sell this deal of a landfill. That's just a -- that's just a pretty way of saying this is a dump.

And people have decided that one of the best places in this country to put a dump is right down here on these people, whether they like it or not. Now, I would just ask this question. When are you-all going to favor us with another one of these visits?

I got a call this evening about four o'clock saying, "You heard about an ADEM meeting?"

Hey, Mike, how are you?
MR. SMITH: I am well. How are you?

MR. BAMBERG: I expect you
are well. Then $I$ had gotten a notice. I said, "No" -- I said, "No, I don't know anything about it," and I said, "I don't really feel good. I think I'm going to miss this one." Well, I couldn't -- I couldn't miss, and $I$ wasn't going to say anything. But $I$ done said it, and you-all are -- you-all go on back and report in, and just understand these folks don't like
it.

Now, I've been clear, right? Or
maybe $I$ hadn't. I ain't a liking it. I ain't ever going to like it. I don't appreciate it. I am offended. I have been disrespected, and all these people have too.
(Audience applause.)
MR. SIBLEY: Again, is there
anyone that has not signed up in the back that would like to make a statement or offer comments?

If you could state your name.
MR. McDANIELS: Kevin
McDaniels. I don't have a comment. I would just like to say a prayer for the citizens of Uniontown. I'd like to pray in Jesus Christ's name that this dump does not come to the city of Uniontown.

I will say the Lord's Prayer. Our Father who art in heaven. Hallowed be Thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us
this day our daily bread and forgive us our trespasses against us. Lead us not into temptation, for Thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory forever and ever. Amen. We pray that ADEM does not allow this plan to come to exist. Amen.
(Audience applause.)
MR. SIBLEY: Ma'am, if you could state your name.

MS. JAMES: Yes, I know. My
name is Carlene James. I am a resident of Uniontown, Alabama. A lot has been said, and $I$ started not to say anything because I don't think any of it's going any place anywhere.

But I want you to know from 1965 until now, I have lived in Uniontown. I haven't lived in the state of Alabama. I made a clear decision to come back home. My parents worked hard to leave property so I would have property to come back home to.

I am back home now, and the
things that $I$ had wished to do as far as send investments to my family abroad, and I'm here and $I$ can't even raise a garden.

I have four lovely children, six double lovely grandchildren, and they can't even come here. They was brought up to love Uniontown, Alabama. Their grandparents were here, and they were taught that always brought them home to visit often, and they had a respect for this place. Now they can't even come back here because of the dump.
Can't raise a garden. Can't
breathe fresh air. Can't drink clean water. So what's there to come back here for?

And now you want to increase. You're increasing because you don't give a damn about who's out here. If you did and had a heart, you would deny some of these permits.

And I see the lawyer over there going to sleep, but $I$ hope you will wake up
and listen to what we got to say, because we're not going away and we're not going to go asleep.

We're here to speak. We're here
to stand and today, tomorrow, and forever. (Audience applause.)

MR. GIPSON: Good
afternoon.
(Audience response.)
MR. GIPSON: My name is
William Gipson. I'm the president of Blackbelt Citizens Fighting for Health and Justice. Since there's not a -- I'd just like to voice my opinion about some of the things that's going on.

I live on County Road 21 about a half a mile down the road from the landfill. We got a problem. You guys -everything got here. Nobody is happy about what's going on. We're really having about all these meetings that you-all come down here and call us out for a meeting, and we don't get no response. We don't get
nothing out of it.
So why is you people keep putting it off? We are human beings, okay, and we have rights, okay. Down in this neighborhood is 100 percent black down here around the landfill where they put the landfill, pushed it up onto people's houses, right in the yard. We don't like that, okay. We are human beings. We -- I know it's a racial thing. Our civil rights -- we got civil rights, okay.

We got -- also it's about human rights. We are humans, and we want justice down here. We want some action. We don't want you-all to come down here, write something on a piece of paper, and then go back to Montgomery and just laugh it off. You probably throw the paper out the window on the way back to Montgomery.

We don't know what we do -- it's
bad for this -- Uniontown, Alabama. We live in a cesspool here. We got a cheese plant on the north end. We got a -- you go on the south end, you got the stockyard, you got the fish plant. Then you go west, you got the raw sewage over there. And you go southwest, you got the landfill.

So we got -- we just caught up in a trap here. The insects, mud on the highway down there -- you can't leave home when it's raining, slipping and sliding. Your cars -- vehicles all full of white mud. Nobody cares, okay.

We need somebody to look upon other human beings. We're not animals. Animals got rights. They spend a lot of money on animal rights. They got all kind of rights in here, but they forgot about human rights. We are humans. We want to be treated like humans. We don't want to share this stuff down -- we got kids, grandkids. Our ancestors worked so hard. They got robbed when they purchased land in the blackbelt area. They sold it to -white folks sold it to my ancestors and stuff because they know it was the poorest
land here. They couldn't raise no cotton or raise nothing on it. You can't grow nothing on a rock. Only the Good Lord can grow stuff on a rock. He can grow trees on a mountain top, but we can't.

So they sold it to our
ancestors, then they passed it down to us. Now you-all put the landfill down there. Probably it's down to zero. Nobody would buy it. You can't sell it.

So what you -- we want you to do is just respect us as a whole. When you go back to Montgomery, we want some action, okay. We've been begging and talking and doing everything and meeting. It's time for some action. If you-all can't help us, just recommend us to somebody that can, okay.

We don't have to go further. If we have to just march on Washington or anything, we ain't going to stop fighting because we are human beings and we deserve respect here in Uniontown.

And you talk about expansion. Why don't you-all just clean up this mess? Fix something before you add onto it. Don't come bringing other stuff in and this is not correct what you got over there. Let's correct the issue. Let's treat the people right.

We got a health issue. People's sick. We need Medicaid cards. People down here living under poverty. They can't even afford to go to the doctor. They got breathing problems. They can't hardly breathe. All the dust, the coal ashes that you-all say is not hazardous to your health. But it's -- it done turned my truck. I got a black truck, and it's white on the top. If it took the paint off the truck, what do you think it do to my lawn? So let's be real about it. And then before we start talking about expansion and all this other stuff, let's correct some of the things that need fixing down there now before you bring all this in
here. All we asking for is some help, okay.

So we don't want to keep running up here to these meetings. And when you go back, you know, you can send a card and say, "Thank you for listening." But now you say, "We can't answer no questions." That's really bad. Like Ms. Murdock says, "What's the purpose of us wasting our breath talking if you can't answer no questions?"

So I would just like to say thank you, and may the Good Lord have a blessing upon you.
(Audience applause.)
MR. SIBLEY: I'm going to
ask one more time, anyone that's not signed up in the back that's not already spoken?

MR. JOHNSON: Good evening.
(Audience response.)
MR. JOHNSON: I feel --
COURT REPORTER: State your name, please.

MR. JOHNSON: My name is
Robert James Johnson. I was born and raised here. This is my home from the older people that died out (microphone disruption) but they lived a good life. Seemed like something we ain't going to -okay, that's better.

But anyway, we have feed lots here. We have stockyards. We have people selling birds, shipping them all across the world. And those are cows, they be shipped every which way. And we got a lot of stuff going here, but seemed like you-all enjoy writing. But I want you to ask yourself, "How long will it take for one of these here hamburger steaks to fall on my table, one of my children get ahold to it, or my wife, or somebody in my family get ahold to it?" Because it's spreading. It just ain't here. It hurts us and it hurts you-all too.

The cows go every which way. A lot of them come down and hunt deer. They
go back and get in their vehicle every which way. So ask yourself, "How long will it be when one of these fall on my table and destroy my family?" Just think about it. Good night.
(Audience applause.)
MR. SIBLEY: All right, the public comment period will end at five o'clock, Thursday, December 22 nd, 2011. Any other comments will be received at the office of Environmental Management in Montgomery by that time.

After consideration of all the oral and written comments, the Department will make a determination regarding the proposed permit modification and prepare a document responding to all relevant comments received.

If you've not marked a
registration card today indicating you wish to receive the Department's response to comments, you should let us know in writing. Or if you want to do it while you're still here, fill out a card in the back and give us to us.

Again, if you want to notify the Department in writing that you want to receive comments and you've not filled out a green card, you can send a request to Mr. Russell Kelly, Chief of the Permits and Services Division. And comments may also be e-mailed to the Department at hearing.officer@adem.state.al.us.

In addition, the Department will
notify all persons who request a notice for this final permit decision. We want to thank you for your attendance and participation this evening and this hearing is adjourned. Thank you.
